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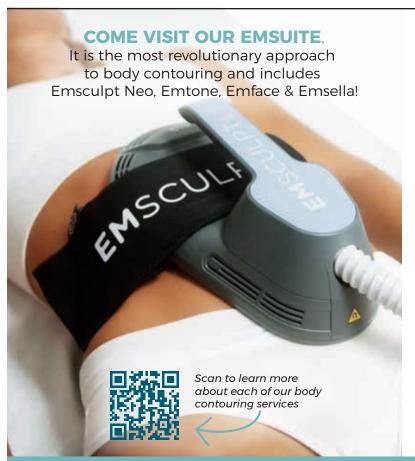
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DUSTIN MOSELEY

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ustin Moseley was born and raised in Tulsa, Oklahoma. His mom, Cheryl, worked at Ascension St. John Medical Center for over 25 years and later spent time in administration at the University of Oklahoma-Tulsa. His father, Ron, served in the Oklahoma Army National Guard for 35 years, followed by 5 years with TSA at the Tulsa International Airport.

Dustin was raised with strong values rooted in faith, family, and a commitment to service. His parents showed him how a strong family structure can be the foundation for a well-lived life. Their support for each other, as well as their support for the broader community, was palpable, leaving a lasting impression on Dustin.

"Early on, I learned that family is super important. You have to have that support system in place to thrive and be successful... Seeing that in their marriage has helped me tremendously," Dustin offers, emotions rising as he revisits memories of his parents. "Seeing how awesome they are — not only with marriage but supporting other people — all the time they donate their time, money, and energy."



After three and a half years in the Army National Guard, Dustin began his career in auto sales. He spent a decade at Jim Norton Toyota and was the company's top salesperson for eight years straight. Meanwhile, Dustin's cousin and current broker, Gloria Allred-Hail, had been in Dustin's ear about joining the real estate business. He resisted change for many years; after all, he made over six figures a year as a top car salesman.

When management changed and the workplace culture shifted, Dustin called Gloria; he was ready to listen. And the rest, as they say, is history. He volunteers for Patriot Guard Riders (https/patriotguard. org), an organization that ensures dignity and respect at memorial services honoring fallen military heroes, first responders, and honorably discharged veterans, and the Oklahoma Warriors Honor Flight (https/oklahomawarriors.org/), an organization that honors Oklahoma's heroes and veterans by flying them to Washington, D.C. to see the memorials at no cost to them.

In real estate, Dustin is an avid supporter of military members, too.

"Whenever I make the first connection with a veteran, we share about our service time. That brings ease with them, to know I am watching out for my brothers and sisters in arms," Dustin explains.

Outside work, you'll find Dustin hanging out with his wife, Megan, a fourth-grade teacher, and three sons, Drake (19), Kameron (17), and Parker (14). He also enjoys fishing, hunting, and other outdoor activities.

At what age did you join the military and how long did you serve?

"I joined the military when I was 29! I had planned to go on Active Duty; however, when I met with my Recruiter for the first time, I learned that the cut-off age for females at that time was 28, so I had just missed it! He introduced me to the Air National Guard as an alternative and that was significantly fine with me since I could be both military AND civilian - basically, having the best of both worlds. I re-enlisted 3 more times and ended up staying until I was able to retire."

What do you remember about the day you enlisted?

"The primary thing I remember about the day I enlisted was having my mom go with me. She didn't know where we were going, but we went to the base to meet with my Recruiter, who would also be meeting my mom for the first time. I think that she was a bit in shock to meet him, to be there, and then to be taken



to meet with the Commander who would be facilitating the swearing-in. Being sworn in and taking the oath to defend my country, to even die for my country, felt so overwhelming and powerful. It was something that I had never said before in my entire life, and then I realized that most people never have nor would ever say those words. It gripped me with emotion; I just broke down and cried. My Commander comforted me and told me to take my time because I was feeling the same emotions that others before me had felt. I was so proud, so emotional, and so overwhelmed all at the same time. I left the base feeling like a forever-changed woman. Between 1994 and now, there has not been a moment that I regretted my decision. I would still be serving now if I weren't too old!"

What led you to join the military? How did you choose your branch of service?

"I had been married for 7 years, and for most of those years, my then-husband and I had talked many times about joining the military together. To make a long story short: I grew tired of just "talking" about it. I truly wanted to join the military and ultimately pursued it on my own without him. It was the day that I enlisted and returned home that I let him know what I had done. He was in a bit of shock, of course! I chose the Air Force because, after having scored so high on my ASVAB and being eligible to select any career path that I wanted (that didn't require a college degree at that time), I felt most proud to have chosen and pursued the Air Force."

Were you ever deployed/did you ever serve overseas? If yes, what

are some things you remember most about your deployment?

"Yes, I went to Germany for an entire month. I had never traveled overseas before and doing so for the first time by myself was exciting and scary all at the same time. I was stationed at Ramstein Air Base. I worked normal working hours from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day, but I had plenty of freedom to go and do things afterward and on the weekends."

What did you learn about yourself during your time in the service?

"That I am amazing! The upbringing that I was blessed with made me truly realize, fully understand, actually recognize, and fully honor my integrity, values, morals, and ethics. I now have a full understanding of these personal attributes that I didn't understand as a younger girl, and now these are a few of my anchors that I will never compromise."

What does Veterans Day mean to you?

"Before my mom passed away, on my birthday, September 29, 2021; I always anticipated that annual phone call from her, calling to thank me for my service and telling me how proud she was of me and how proud she was to be my mom. She's the only person who ever did that, and it always meant such a great deal to me, even if only my mom cared. I don't get to receive those phone calls anymore, so Veterans Day has lost a bit of "glory" for me; but in secret, I'm honored to have served and am proud beyond measure to be a Veteran. I'm so proud of all my fellow Veterans, too. I hold the value of service in high regard for each and every one of them."

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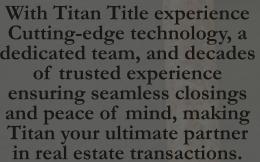
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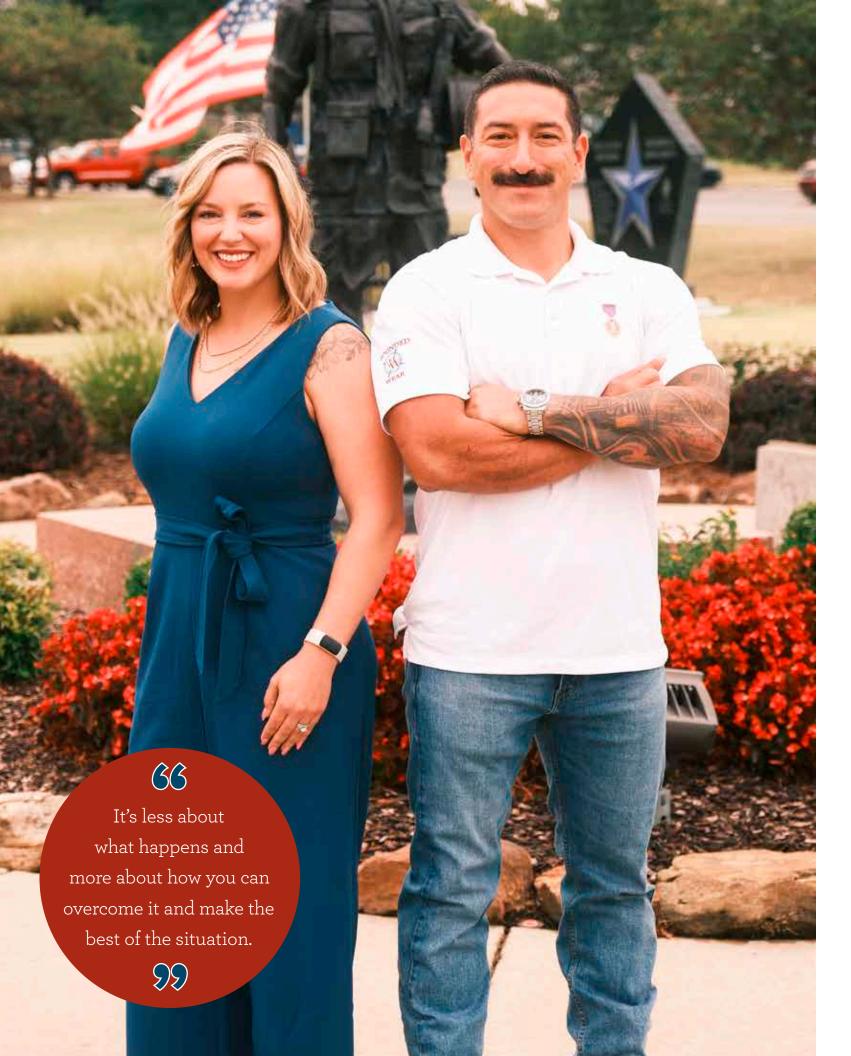






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April 3, 2012 was a date Ashley and Shaun Elizondo will never forget. At the time, Ashley was back home with their young son, Aiden, in Alaska, and Shaun was deployed in Afghanistan with the Army. In the blink of an eye, their whole world turned upside down.

"I work, so it went up in flames. Specialist Jeffery L.

White Jr, the driver, was killed, and Shaun was trapped. He was able to climb over the radio mount in the center, and the gunner pulled him through the turret."

By the grace of God, Shaun survived, but the next few months were laden with the hardships of recovery — both mental and physical.

Shaun suffered third-degree burns on 60% of his body. He was flown from Afghanistan to Germany to

Texas, undergoing several surgeries along the way. He spent ued put 27 days in the hospital between ICU and inpatient care, and that was just the start of his recovery. But with faith and the strength of family, Shaun and Ashley persevered.

"Watching the strongest person I know struggle more than someone could put into words was devastating but also really inspiring," Ashley continues. "Watching him struggle and come back was amazing but hard. I didn't know if I'd ever have the same husband back. It took three months before I saw the first smile. I saw how people might not make it through those things, but we kept showing up for each other, and we made it through."

"I was in a dark place for what seemed like a long time, but I didn't want Aiden to see his dad stuck there," Shaun adds. "I didn't want the message to be that hard things happen,

and you are stuck forever. I wanted him to know it's less about what happens and more about how you can overcome it and make the best of the situation. In time, that pulled me out of the darkness and the light came."

On the other side of this tragedy was a new way of life for Ashley and Shaun. They rebuilt their lives with immense gratitude and renewed strength. After a stint in Texas, they exturned to Alaska for a time, where Ashley contin-

returned to Alaska for a time, where Ashley continued pursuing a career in nursing. In 2015, they returned to their hometown of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, taking another step on their journey together.

In Oklahoma, Ashley continued pursuing a career as a nurse while Shaun tried his hand at real estate. He was licensed in 2015 and became so busy that Ashley joined him the following year.

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"I kept getting busier, and eventually, she got licensed. It turns out she's a much better real estate agent than me," Shaun says with a smile.

Shaun stepped away from the business for the next few years as he pursued a career with the Tulsa Fire Department. Meanwhile, Ashley took the reins in real estate, building a successful team and business. Shaun rejoined her in late 2022, and now they are building a top team together at Keller Williams Preferred.

Ashley and Shaun's team is rooted in integrity and family values. They are driven to serve their community, one family at a time. Their ultimate vision is to have a small but mighty team that allows their community to grow and thrive. Their family is flourishing, too; their children, Aiden and Emalyn, are now 14 and 10.

"It's less about the bad things that happen to you and more about how you respond," Shaun adds. "Our book is still being written, and the best parts are still to come."





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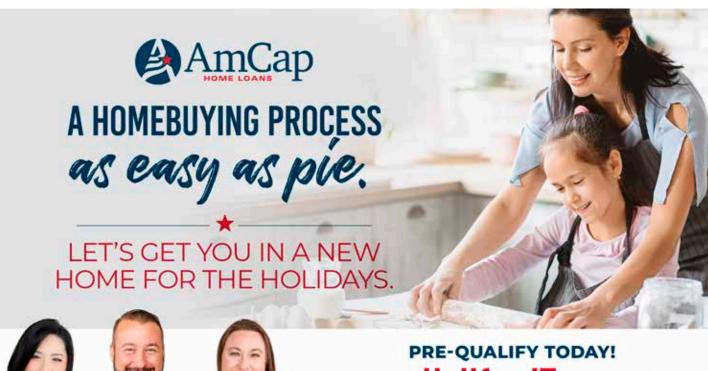
